

Programming Snapshot

Individual & Family

Student Instruction - B2G Mentors lead elementary, middle, and high school students, both virtually and/or in-person, through common core-qualifying and core value-focused academic instruction. Education sessions take place during school time and after-school. I.E. B2G Stocks and Bonds, B2G Pathways 2 Literacy, B2G Elite Squad, B2G Coping A to Z, and the ever-popular B2G Suit Up Core Value Challenge.

Classroom Intervention - B2G Mentors attend and monitor student behavior during school-sponsored academic instruction. B2G observations and subsequent private break-out room (if virtual) or sidebar hallway (if in-person) social-emotional and restorative justice-based interventions offers much-needed support to teachers and a positive but firm structure for students.

Social-Emotional Enrichment Hours/Hangouts - B2G Mentors engage elementary, middle, and high school students, both virtually and/or in-person, in healthy conversations and peer-to-peer social-emotional exploration. Disruptive differences are left at the door so that student's shared life experiences that need space may have the floor.

Parent Engagement Events - B2G Mentors convene concerned parent populations for evenings of problem solving and social-emotional free expression. Keeping your child on the right path while surrounded by incessant inner-city violence and gang activity is no easy task.

Community

Student and Campus Safe Passage - B2G mentors offer 40 weeks of coordinated safety mapping for elementary, middle, and high school students to/from campus. On-campus, school-time presence for continued relationship building. Off-campus events for continued relationship building. Monthly meetings for school administrator, parent, and public safety groups. Monthly Spotlight on Safety newsletters.

Peace-Building - B2G mentors offer 40 weeks of peace-building for elementary, middle, and high school students on-campus. On-campus engagement for continued peacebuilding. Monthly meetings for school administrator, parent, and peace-building groups.

Community Development - B2G mentors offer 40 weeks of community development. On-campus and off-campus events and engagement. Monthly meetings for school administrator, parent, and community groups.

Wellness - B2G mentors offer a varied number of weeks (determined per school's preference) of wellness related to physical activity, emotional well-being and joy, and/or financial literacy. After-school sport engagement as positive incentives for positive student academic performance and personal growth. Additionally, home well-checks as needed per student population.





PURSUE, volumes 1 and 2, are next-generation empowerment journals that support and encourage youth.


PURSUE's instructor-guided, peace-building journal activities are designed to help students understand and master personal and social-emotional challenges.

PURSUE is a 10-part series for students that spans the first 100 days of a semester.

PURSUE increases attendance, inclusion, peaceful resolution, and writing and comprehension - all while introducing student scholars to 10 success principles for expanded leadership awareness.

The language used is simple and direct - making it easy for a reader of any level to understand. Additionally, PURSUE uses real world examples that evoke strong emotion and work to aid the reader's overall comprehension of the lesson plans.

PURSUE can be used as a positive teaching aid when addressing social-emotional driven topics like peaceful resolution, community development, how to down-regulate aggression, increase school performance, break cycles of violence, build better relationships, and other deeply influential experiences that school-age youth experience.



Currently, we have schools and student populations requesting B2G programming but they do not have funds to support it.

Deepen Roots By Increasing the Amount of Hours On Campuses Per Day To Support Ever-Increasing School Administration Needs

Every school has a different culture and every grade level presents different safety and social-emotional challenges - not to mention as youth grow older they tend to hold more trauma and more complex behavior patterns. Our school partners would love to engage our partnership more fully throughout the school day but they do not have the funds to support it.


