School Experience Survey




- The School Experience Survey is administered annually and is designed to gather feedback from students, staff, and parents so that schools can learn what they are doing well and what they need to refine
- Survey results provide schools with very important feedback from all teachers and staff, students in grades 4-12, and all parents who have at least one child enrolled in a pre-K through 12th grade school

School Experience Survey

The School Experience Survey participation rates for the 22-23 school year represent the highest ever for students, staff, and parents, and teachers.

Participation rates for all groups grew substantially this year compared to last year.







Student Perspectives on Safety by School Level





✓ For the Safety items on the survey for parents, rates of agreement remained essentially unchanged for elementary and high school parents; however, for middle school parents there was a statistically significant decline compared to last year

"I feel safe in the neighborhood around my school this year"




School Experience Survey - Staff

- For the staff Safety items, the Fall 2022 rates of agreement were up to 10-percentage points higher than they were four years ago
- While the vast majority of staff at all three school levels (Elementary, Middle, High) reported feeling safe on school grounds, Fall 2022 rates of agreement were slightly *lower* compared to Fall 2021. The same held true for staff reporting feeling safe in the neighborhood around their school





Community-Based Safety Programs & Partnerships


- Community-Based Safety Pilot Programs: The District actively works with community-based organizations to provide critical services to our students, including Safe Passage, Community Development, and Peace Building
- Traffic Safety: District staff works with city partners to implement safety initiatives,
 such as crossing guards, speed humps, and additional enforcement as needed
- **Safety Collaboratives:** There are over 30 active Safety Collaboratives across the District that bring together schools with key partners from law enforcement and the community to create a holistic approach for student safety



CRIME INCIDENT BY BOARD DISTRICT FY 2021-22 VS FY 2022-23


CRIME INCIDENT Crimes Against Persons Report FY 2021-22 vs. FY 2022-23

Percentage of CAP Crimes Occured OFF Campus 2022-2023










Los Angeles School Police Department Safe Passage Calls for Service FY 2021-2022 vs. FY 2022-2023
