Girls Run 95th Running Club teaches girls socialemotional skills and girl empowerment while training

for a 5K fun run!



95th Street Elementary School's **Principal**, **Manuel Nava**, is highly devoted to supporting all students, staff, and families by providing numerous clubs that promote social/emotional wellness, academic, excellence, and outstanding attendance.
95th Street Elementary (ES) School has

a variety of extracurricular activities to support Student learning and wellness. One example is the Girls Run 95th Running Club, which began in 2023. Each year has drawn more interest from the school community and participation has increased to 50 girls in grades 3-5, who meet twice a week after school. With the support of *Principal Manuel Nava*, this club is facilitated and led by the School *Psychologist, Monica Solera*. What makes this club stand out is that it primarily focuses on girls' empowerment while opportunities for social skills development and physical fitness. Club members train for 10 weeks to run a 5K race at the end of each Spring semester. Each student is then partnered with an adult staff or family member for support in completing the 5K. The girls also encourage each other and chant while practicing, "Who Runs the World? Girls!" Ms. Solera is a School Psychologist committed to providing a high standard of support services and engaging students at 95th ES to be READY FOR THE WORLD

Aimee Garcia-Fuentes, a Panorama High School Psychologist Aimee has been a School psychologist at Panorama High School since 2015 and holds a Board



Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA) Certification since 2017. Over the last nine years, Aimee has sponsored the school's GSA "PRIDE Club." Last year, Aimee was awarded the **Certificate of Special Congressional Recognition** for her work with **LGBTQ+** students. This year the Panorama girls' soccer team needed a coach. As a former player, coach, and referee, Aimee volunteered to coach the girls' team. She also provided the players with weekly mental health and academic check-ins to make sure they were on track to maintain the sports-academic eligibility. Aimee has been a runner, and she has run many half marathons, but never completed a full marathon until this year. Based on her efforts, eleven students qualified for the LA Marathon in March. Aimee helped promote and get support for the runners by handling the Instagram page for the Panorama High School **Students Run LA** team, providing students with food at the end of the run, along the parents and volunteer staff and students. **Great job Aimee Garcia-Fuentes!**

Legislation Day In the month of May, the Division of Special Education invited three family members, from the Community Advisory Committee, to travel to Sacramento for Legislation Day. Members had an opportunity to support Assembly Bill 2173, the legislation that codifies the term "Emotional Disturbance" (ED), and as described in the Federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), to be changed to "Emotional Disability." Supporting this change will provide families more opportunities for their children to receive special education services. Voicing their experience with legislators will make an impact on future decision making at the capital.

Teaching Expected Behavior Through Storytelling

You can teach your child expected behaviors in different situations using social storytelling. For example, reading a story to your child about a social

situation (e.g., going to a birthday party) can help them feel more prepared, especially if your child has trouble with a particular situation. Stories can also help children prepare for new experiences such as getting their first haircut or going to a new classroom. When introducing a story, tell your child the topic of the story and connect it to a situation/experience that your child has knowledge of. After you read the story together, you can review the most relevant information from the story, such as how to start a conversation or how the expected behaviors sound like or look like. Allow your child to ask questions about the story. Be sure to revisit the story on a regular basis. Reading the story together daily for several days is a good starting point. You can create your own stories for social situations or upcoming activities based on your child's needs. Visit the link below for more examples
