




YOUTH-LED SERVICE IMPACTS YOUTH

When Young People Participate

Belonging

Feeling supported by others; that you depend on others, and that you get value from the group; you believe the people around you make a difference to you.

Meaning, Purpose

A life aim that is both personally meaningful and contributes to the world beyond the self.

Mattering

Feeling valued by others, that others depend on you, and that you add value to the group; you believe you make a difference in the world around you.

Hope

The belief that the future will be better than the present and that you have the ability to make it happen.

Barriers to Youth Participation

U

Lack of Opportunity

Youth aren't expected or personally asked to participate.

03

Lack of Equitable Access

Youth can't overcome inequitable systemic barriers or lack of resources.

Lack of Knowledge & Skills

Youth aren't taught the practical skills necessary to participate.

04

Lack of Hope & Connection

Youth feel disconnected, disaffected, disillusioned, and/or disenfranchised.





Link to College and Career Readiness Skills

<u>Critical Thinking /</u> Problem Solving:

Ask youth to think about the issue, why it is so important to address, why they care about it, and what they can do about it



Encourage creativity, originality, new ideas and ways of doing things



Collaboration:

Promote effective teamwork, shared responsibility, flexibility, valuing the work of others

Communication:

Provide youth with opportunities to write about and speak about their project – to other students, the community, media, and public officials



How do you talk to your children about service?





Talking to your Child about Service

Key Points	Prompt
Introduction:	"How can I help you discover how you can make a positive impact and develop leadership skills?
Start with Spark: "What activities or hobbies excite you the most? What are you passionate about?"	
Identify the Fire:	"Are there important issues in our community that you feel need to be addressed? What changes would you like to see?
ASAP Strategies:	'Can you brainstorm some actions we can take to address these issues? Let's think about raising awareness, offering service, advocating for change, or supporting philanthropy."
"Do you know leaders who inspire you? What qualities do they have that you admire?" Share examples and stories:	
Encourage reflection:	"What kind of leader do you want to be? How can you inspire others to make a difference?"
Follow-up and support:	"As you explore leadership, what challenges do you think you might face? How can I help you overcome them and celebrate your successes?"
Lead by example:	"Can you think of any experiences where you've seen our family involved in community service? How do you think we can set an example of helping others?"
Celebrate each step:	"What steps have you taken recently to make a difference? Let's celebrate your efforts and accomplishments together!"
Keep the conversation going:	"How do you feel about our discussions about leadership and community involvement? Would you like to continue talking about these topics in the future?"



Childhood Hunger	Language Arts/ Social Studies	Awareness	Students educate the community on summer breakfast programs in their community/state.	
Energy Conservation	Science/Computer Science	Awareness	Students investigate ways to conserve energy and host a conservation expo to educate the community about effective conservation methods.	
Childhood Obesity	Health/PE	Awareness	Students organize a health and nutrition fair, with different stations.	
Literacy	Language Arts/Foreign Language	Service	Students start a buddy reading program, mentoring kindergarten students.	
Bullying	Language Arts/Social Studies	Service	Students mentor younger students on ways to treat each other with respect.	
Recycling	Math/Science	Service	Students collect and categorize used items at school for their recycling programs.	
Childhood Hunger	Social Studies/Health	Advocacy	Students advocate for a Statewide Breakfast Program.	
Teen Driver Safety	Language Arts/Marketing	Advocacy	Students encourage local elected officials to endorse a teen driver safety pledge.	
Children's Healthcare	Business	Philanthropy	Students set up a book stand to raise funds to support childhood cancer research.	
Disaster Reconstruction	Arts/Math	Philanthropy	Students design, make, and sell their self-made quilts to raise money for young children and their families who are victims of a disaster.

Empowering Your Child as a Leader

Key Points	Example
Be supportive	Discuss project ideas with your child, offering guidance without taking over.
Encourage independence	Let your child lead the planning and organization, providing suggestions to build confidence.
Communicate openly	Create a supportive environment for your child to share thoughts and concerns about the project.
Lead by example	Volunteer together to show the importance of service. Participate in project events enthusiastically.
Embrace diversity	Encourage exploring different service opportunities and discuss cultural diversity.
Cultivate resilience	Help your child view setbacks as learning opportunities, brainstorming solutions together.
Set goals together	Set clear, achievable goals and celebrate progress along the way.
Share inspirational stories	Introduce your child to role models who have made positive impacts, inspiring them to make a difference.




