### Survey Demographics

- 54 LCAP meetings held across the District with over 1,100 attendees
- 855 surveys submitted, in person and online
- □ 3,560 individual responses collected
  - 51% parents
  - 24% students
  - 10% teachers and staff members
  - 79% Hispanic or Latino
  - 40% English Learners (students or parents of EL's)
  - 58% identified as receiving Free or Reduced Lunch



# Common Themes & Solutions from the Community: District Goals

- 100% Graduation
  - Increase the graduation rate
- Proficiency for All
  - Decrease the percentage of Long Term English Learners
- 100% Attendance
  - Ensure all youth are attending school regularly
- Parent, Community, & Student Engagement
  - Increase percentage of parents trained on academic initiatives
- School Safety
  - Increase the number of schools using positive behavior discipline systems

## Common Themes & Solutions from the Community: Open Comments

- Ensuring there are high-quality teachers, administrators in every school; holding staff accountable to results and ensuring these professionals receive support and training
- Ensuring academic achievement and proficiency for all students
- Supporting students with academic interventions, such as tutoring and small-group support
- Increasing Afterschool and Arts programs
- Decreasing class sizes

#### Introduction

The overarching theme of the LCAP Input Sessions was to ask community stakeholders,

  - 26% Elementary, 10% Middle School, 42% High School






- What should we prioritize under the District's goal of 100% Graduation?

#### What should we prioritize under the District's goal of 100% Graduation?








What should we prioritize under the District's goal of Proficiency for All?

#### What should we prioritize under the District's goal of Proficiency for All?






- What should we prioritize under the District's goal of 100% Attendance?

#### What should we prioritize under the District's goal of 100% Attendance?






- What should we prioritize under the District's goal of Parent, Community, & Student Engagement?

#### What should we prioritize under Parent, Community and Student Engagement?






- What should we prioritize under the District's goal of School Safety:
  - Top Response: Increase the percentage of schools ensuring effective and fair handling of behavior by promoting positive solutions through the reform of student discipline policies




#### What should we prioritize under the District's goal of School Safety?






- Of the five District goals, which one would be your top priority?

  - Top Response: Focus on academic proficiency & skill acquisition






Which strategy should be a focus for <u>English</u> <u>Learners</u>?

  - Focus on academic proficiency & skill acquisition


Ensure progress toward reclassification

  - Academic achievement and proficiency
  - Ensuring there are high-quality teachers, administrators in every school; holding staff accountable to results and ensuring these professionals receive support and training

"Ensure that all [students] receive an academic support system..."



- How can the District improve student achievement?
  - Ensure high-quality teachers and administrators in all schools
  - Increase and embrace Parent Engagement
  - Offer Arts & Enrichment Programs
  - Support students through Academic Interventions and Tutoring
  - Decrease class sizes

"Keep programs that support the arts (music, art, drama). Research has shown that these activities stimulate academic achievement, creative thinking, math skills, and general well-being of students."



- What are successful strategies for increasing parent and student involvement?
  - Workshops and training for parents
  - Strong communication with parents through multiple channels
  - Creating welcoming school environments where parents feel a part of the school community

"Focus on building trusting, collaborative relationships among teachers, families and community members. Recognize, respect and address families' needs...Embrace a philosophy of partnership where power and responsibility are shared."



- What are successful strategies for supporting Low-Income, English Learner, and Foster Youth students in LAUSD?
  - Academic interventions and individualized support
  - EL support and striving for reclassification
  - Ensure teachers and principals in schools get support and training they need to directly support high-needs students

"Maintain training and knowledge constantly over academic approaches." *"Training for teachers on best practices."* 



## Spotlight: Youth Town Hall input

- Achieving 100% Graduation
  - Student Solution: Ensure students are consistently engaged in their progress towards graduation and are informed about available resources
- Achieving Proficiency for All
  - Student Solution: Test preparation (more for ELs, bilingual training for teachers, proper class placement)
- Achieving 100% Attendance
  - Student Solution: Maximize homeroom periods so they are more structured and relevant
- Achieving Parent, Community, & Student Engagement
  - Student Solution: School-site specific focus groups and surveys to redefine student engagement and participation
- Achieving School Safety
  - Student Solution: Community meetings that focus on the safety of the students (inside and outside of school campus)

  - May 26, 2015 (Time TBD)
  - 2 public hearings June 2015
- Board approves LCAP with LEA Budget before June 30, 2015
