Safety and Emergency Preparedness



We're grateful for Local District Central leaders who do what it takes to ensure school campuses are safe. The 2018 Spring Semester Alternative Emergency Drill is right around the corner and will be a shelter-in-place exercise. The drill may be conducted

during the week of February 26th and is to be scheduled by each school.



School leaders are encouraged to work with Paul Ishimaru, Director of Blackboard Connect, to assist you with putting out a test message during the drill. Using the Shelter in place exercise can provide leaders an opportunity to use a cell

phone to send a blackboard connect message when staff doesn't have access to the main office nor access to a landline. By using a cell phone, schools leaders can relay messages to communicate with staff. This is a great opportunity to update every staff member's emergency information. We will be putting together a Job Aide for Making Remote Messages to Staff. Please refer to *REF-5380.7 Spring Semester 2018 Alternate Emergency Exercise* for more information (Attachment 2).

Creating A Positive School Climate

According to the National Center on Safe Supportive Learning Environments, positive school climate is linked to higher attendance rates as well as improved academic achievement. Their "Safe and Supportive Schools Model" highlights three areas that make up a positive school climate: engagement, safety, and environment. Just as attendance is everyone's business, so is the responsibility that we have to create



an environment that is welcoming and supportive for our students. This may include setting a re-entry plan in place or making referrals for students that are facing various challenges, in order to increase their chance at success. Measuring school climate can be done by surveying students, staff, and parents as well as collecting data on the community's perception of the school. As you assess school climate, collaborate with other stakeholders to ensure that the practices in place are maximizing student learning capacity and engagement.

School Mental Health: PSW Mid-year Reports

Each school-based Psychiatric Social Worker (PSW) is required to complete a mid-year report that they are expected to review with their principals. The mid-year report aligns with the District goal of 100% graduation and its objectives of school safety, 100% attendance and parent, student and community engagement.

The data for the report is extrapolated from each PSW's documentation and details the following information by school site: for Fall Semester 2017:

- * Number of Individual Students served and their ethnicity
- * Top 5 Issue Types of all Individual Students served
- * Top 5 Service Types of all Individual Students served
- * Targeted Student Populations data of all Individual Students served
- * Program Impact to School
- * Evidence-Based Practices utilized (individual and group)
- * Group Counseling Data
- * Crisis Intervention Services (suicidal and self-injurious behavior, threat and school site crisis team development and implementation)
- * School Wide Support (monthly campaigns and events)
- * Intern Services (if applicable)

The Mid-Year reports provides school leaders an opportunity to discuss with the PSW and School Mental Health Coordinator areas of most impact that the PSW provided during the Fall semester as well as the opportunity to plan for the remainder of this school year. Additionally, the report demonstrates how your PSW is using preventative, targeted and intensive evidence-based interventions to improve integration, coordination of care within the school and with community partnerships. An End-of-year report will provide details of both Fall and Spring semesters. Restorative Justice: Restorative Justice Signposts

You are doing Restorative Justice practices when you ...

- 1. Focus on the harms of crime rather than the rules that have been broken,
- 2. Show equal concern and commitment to victims, offenders, and their families, involving all in the process of justice,
- 3. Work toward the restoration of victims and families, empowering them and responding to their needs as they see them,
- 4. Support offenders while encouraging them to understand the harm they have done, accept and carry out their obligations,
- 5. Recognize that while obligations may be difficult for offenders, they should not be intended as harms and they must be achievable,
- 6. Provide opportunities for dialogue, direct or indirect, between victim and offender as appropriate,
- 7. Find meaningful ways to involve the community and to respond to the community bases of crime,
- 8. Encourage collaboration and reintegration rather than coercion and isolation,
- 9. Give attention to the unintended consequences of your actions and programs, and
- 10. Show respect to all parties victims, offenders, family and community members, justice colleagues.

Dear L.A. Unified Family,

The recent tragic events involving school shootings has understandably created anxiety and concern regarding overall school safety. I want to assure you that the dedicated school police officers serving the Los Angeles Unified School District are committed to providing protection for our students, employees and school communities. We take this responsibility seriously and will use every available method and practice to protect school communities.

This includes immediately responding to safety threats received, including those from social media. Unfortunately, social media posts depicting pictures of firearms and other weapons, coupled with statements suggesting a threat to school safety, tend to increase significantly following tragic incidents. Equally concerning is the fact that a large majority of these social media posts involve students and school-age children attempting to cause fear and anxiety as a simple joke or thrill of experiencing reactions.

Please know that our school police department and our law enforcement partners take these threats seriously. Investigators and school police officers immediately respond to and investigate <u>all</u> such threats received. These threats are unlawful, regardless of intention, and may result in serious criminal and civil consequences that include possible financial restitution for hours spent on investigations. They also may have serious administrative consequences at the school level, including possible expulsion and graduation implications. We need everyone to understand that these irresponsible actions can have life-long implications.

Here is what parents and guardians can do to help:

- Please take a moment to discuss this important issue with your children.
- Please stay connected and monitor social media activities your children are engaged in.
- Please reach out to your principal, the local police or other trained professionals if you see behavior that has potential for causing self-harm or harm to others.
- Please ensure that if you own a firearm, keep it locked in an approved storage component or locker: This is the law!
- Please ensure that your children do not have access to firearms while visiting homes of friends or relatives.
- If you hear or see something, say something! Please report safety concerns to your school or to law enforcement. The Los Angeles School Police Department also has an anonymous 24-hour Weapons Hot-Line at 1-800-954-4357 (1-800-954 HELP).

Safety is everyone's responsibility. By working, talking and listening together – especially with our students – we will continue to keep our school communities safe.

Estimada Familia del Distrito Escolar Unificado de Los Ángeles (LAUSD),

Los recientes eventos trágicos a causa de tiroteos en escuelas han creado ansiedad y preocupaciones sobre la seguridad escolar en general. Quiero asegurarles que los dedicados agentes de la Policía del Distrito Escolar Unificado de Los Ángeles se comprometen a ofrecer protección para los estudiantes, empleados y comunidades escolares. Asumimos esta responsabilidad con suma seriedad y utilizaremos todo método y práctica disponible para proteger a las comunidades escolares.

Nuestro servicio a todas las escuelas incluye responder inmediatamente ante toda amenaza que recibamos contra la seguridad, incluso aquellas que aparecen en las redes sociales. Desafortunadamente, las publicaciones en las redes sociales que muestran imágenes de armas de fuego y otras armas, junto con comentarios en tono de amenaza a la seguridad escolar, están aumentando considerablemente después de un incidente trágico. Imágenes en las redes sociales son preocupantes porque involucran a menores de edad intentando causar miedo y ansiedad como broma o para ver las reacciones del público.

Por favor recuerden que nuestro departamento de policía escolar y nuestros socios en otros departamentos de policía estamos cumpliendo con la ley al responder a estas amenazas con toda seriedad. Los investigadores y agentes de la policía escolar responden inmediatamente e investigan toda amenaza de ese tipo que recibimos. Estas amenazas son ilegales, sin importar la intención, y posiblemente podrían producir consecuencias de carácter penal o civil, que incluyen posible restitución financiera por horas dedicadas a las investigaciones. También podrían generar graves consecuencias administrativas a nivel escolar, lo cual incluye la posibilidad de ser expulsados o repercusiones en la graduación. Es necesario que todos entiendan que estos actos irresponsables pueden generar implicaciones que afectan a la persona de por vida.

Los padres pueden emplear las siguientes sugerencias para colaborar con nosotros:

- Por favor dediquen unos minutos a hablar sobre este importante tema con sus hijos.
- Por favor manténganse conectados y supervisando las actividades en redes sociales de sus hijos.
- Por favor comuníquense con el director, personal de la policía escolar u otros profesionales expertos si ven conductas que podrían producir auto-lesión o daño a otras personas.
- Por favor asegúrese de que si es dueño(a) de un arma de fuego, que la mantenga en un lugar bajo llave, dentro de un componente de almacenamiento o armario aprobado: ¡La ley lo exige!
- Por favor asegúrese de que sus hijos no tengan acceso a armas de fuego al visitar los hogares de sus amigos o familiares.



site has personnel who are able to turn off all Heating/Ventilation/Air Conditioning (HVAC) systems. As personnel or duties may have changed on campuses, this exercise offers an opportunity to practice this essential emergency response procedure.

This document updates REF-5380.6 Spring Semester 2017 Alternate Emergency Exercise, dated December 9, 2016, issued by District Operations, and reflects the change in category of emergency drill for Spring 2018 as well as current organizational structure.

- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Prior to the Spring 2018 Emergency Exercise, it is strongly suggested that site administration complete the following activities:
 - A. Pre-Exercise Activities
 - 1. Review the school's Integrated Safe School Plan with all faculty and staff. Confirm that each staff member understands his or her role in response to this type of emergency. Schools are encouraged to take the online STEPS shelter-in-place training and other emergency training on the Learning Zone. More information is available at http://steps.lausd.net.
 - 2. Work with the plant manager and local Maintenance and Operations personnel to review shutdown procedures for HVAC systems and individual heating and cooling units. HVAC systems draw in outside air as part of their operation, and must be turned off during shelter-in-place incidents. Ensure that multiple people on campus are trained and designated to shut off all HVAC systems in the event of an incident. Schools are encouraged to clearly label shut-off switches so that they will be easy to find and operate, and pictures of switches and shutdown directions can be stored in a binder with a school map for the utilities emergency team.
 - 3. Assess the needs of all students and staff with special needs. This includes, but is not limited to, students on the Welligent list of students with a life-threatening condition. Ensure that those with special needs have the resources in place to successfully endure this emergency. This response scenario may be a challenge for some students and staff who are dependent on specific supplies, have respiratory challenges, are sensitive to environmental conditions, or who may not have heard or understood the initial "shelter-in-place" announcement over the intercom. One goal of this drill is to identify these people and understand their needs so that in a real emergency they will be safe and secure.



- 5. Remind all staff that, in the event of a disaster, all District employees may be designated "Disaster Service Workers," pursuant to Section 3100 of the California Government Code, and as such, will need to remain at school. All District employees are strongly encouraged to have a complete Home Emergency Plan and emergency supplies in place, so that they know their family will be provided for in their absence.
- 6. Notify parents of the drill and invite them to observe and/or participate. Parent notification sample letters in English and Spanish are attached. The sample parent notification letter is also available in Armenian, Chinese, and Korean and may be downloaded from the Administrator's Corner tab at <u>http://achieve.lausd.net/emergencyservices</u>.
- 7. Encourage staff and parents to download the LAUSD emergency plan app for smartphones and tablet devices. Information is available at http://achieve.lausd.net/emergencyapps.
- 8. Remind students to discuss with their parents specific family plans in the event of this type of an emergency.
- 9. Ensure that student emergency cards are current and complete, and that current phone numbers for students and staff are in the Blackboard Connect database.
- 10. Inspect and inventory all emergency supplies and equipment in the emergency response bin. Replace or add any items as necessary.
- 11. Inspect the information in the School Emergency Response Box. Make sure class lists and contact information are up to date and accurate. For assistance on the contents of the School Emergency Response Box, see REF-5450.1, *School Emergency Response Boxes*, dated March 19, 2013.
- B. Exercise Scenario

Your school has been notified by the Office of Environmental Health and Safety (OEHS) that there has been an accidental industrial release of an airborne toxic material near your school. The cloud of materials is being carried slowly by the wind in your direction. On the advice of authorities, you are directed to have your students and staff shelter-in-place until there is



no longer a threat. Based on information received by OEHS, it is estimated that students and staff will have to shelter-in-place for at least 30 minutes, if not longer.

Refer to the Shelter-in-Place section of Emergency Threats and Hazards in the *Integrated Safe School Plan* for guidance on sheltering in place.

Site administration is to make plans and provisions to communicate with all classrooms and respond to needs of students and staff with medical or physical conditions. Classroom communication should include school phone system, school radios, cell phones, and e-mail distribution lists.

This type of emergency makes communication with classrooms very challenging. A critical goal of this drill is to ensure that there are at least two methods to get information to and from classrooms.

Site Administration is to confirm that all students and staff are sheltered in a safe environment. Please check that all doors, windows, and gates are closed and locked.

C. Post-Exercise Evaluation

Conduct an after-action review of the exercise with members of the staff who held an emergency position during this drill. Complete the on-line drill evaluation form at http://emergencydrills.lausd.net. (See REF-5803.3, *Emergency Drills and Procedures*, dated March 2, 2013, for information about the on-line emergency drill evaluation process.)
