

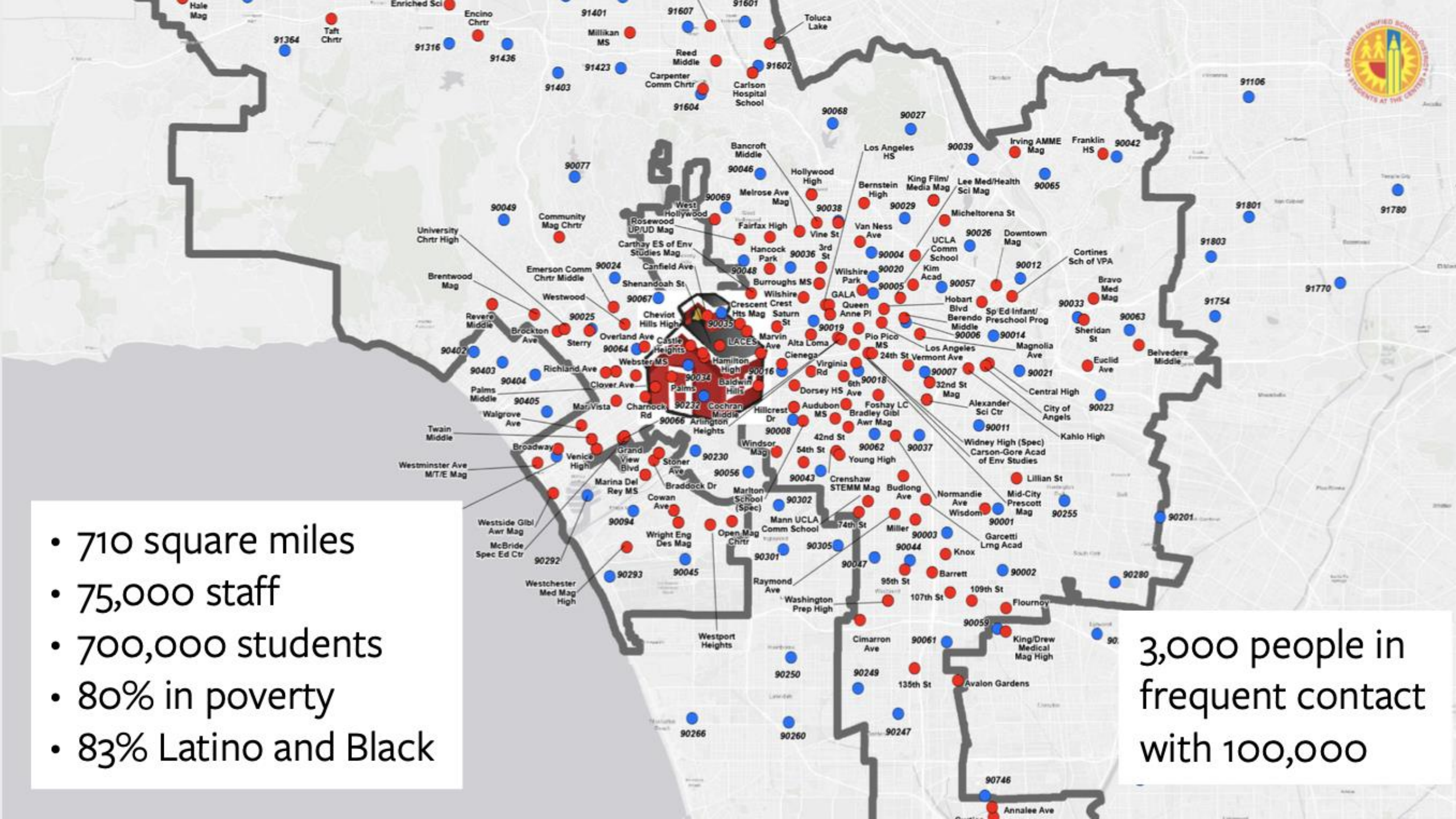

THE VOYAGE OF THE TITANIC

Students will learn about astronomy, planets, comets, galaxies and technology used to explore space.

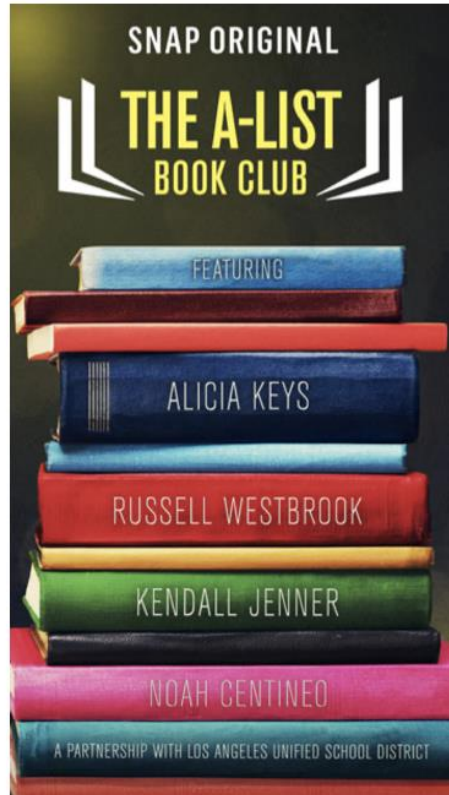


MUSIC

- Los Angeles Unified teachers and ILLUMINATION are creating a high school class that meets Los Angeles Unified graduation and University of California college entrance requirements

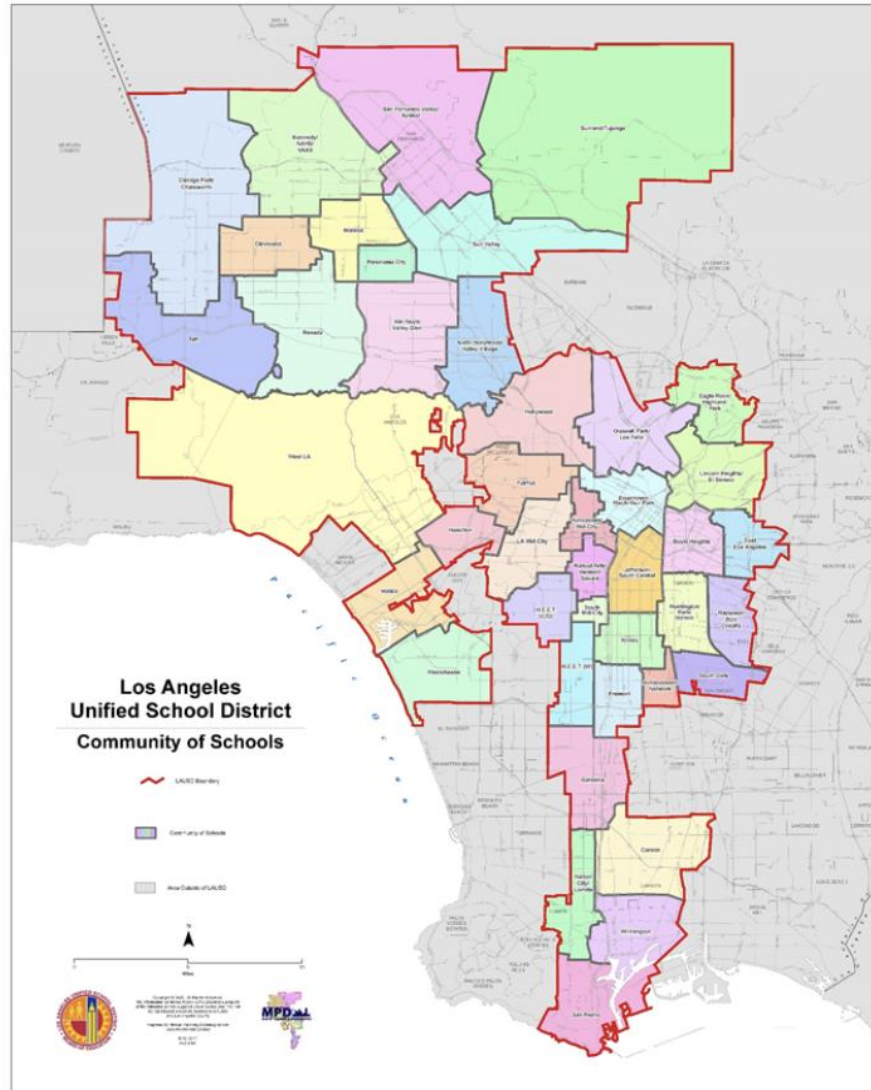

Every student will build a strong foundation in literacy, math and critical thinking skills in elementary school

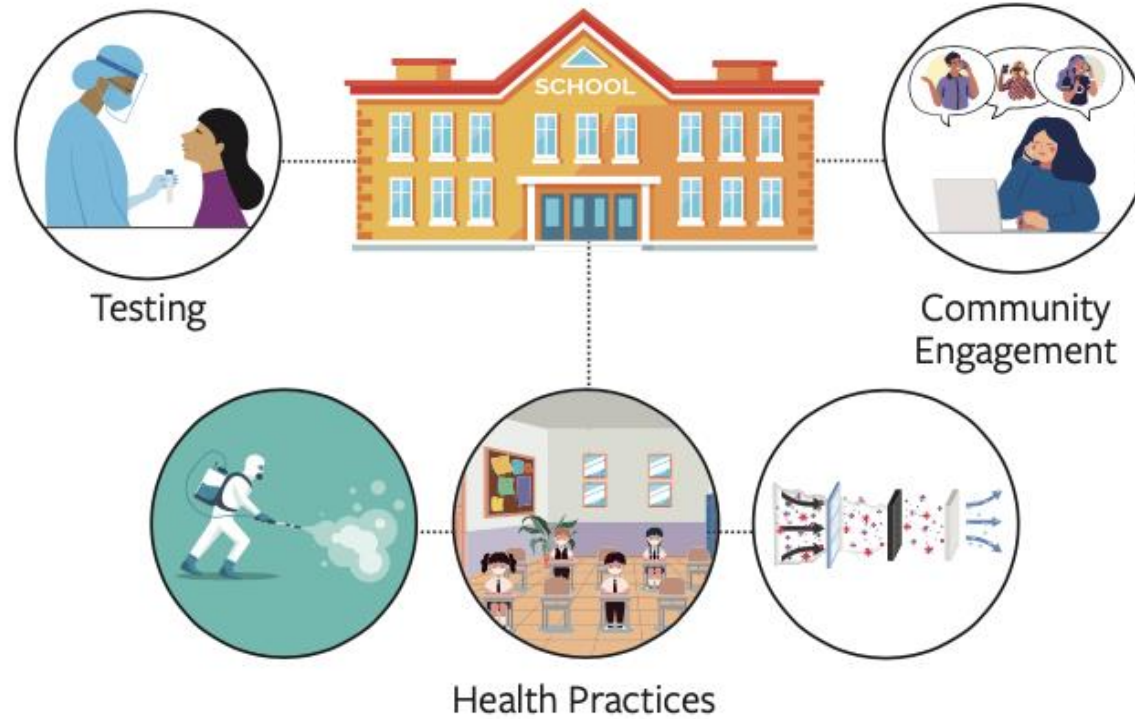
Why is this needed?

- Students who read at grade level by third grade are more likely to graduate from high school and college
- Many K-3 students are not proficient in reading
- Addressing the COVID learning gap

- Extended learning opportunities at every elementary school
- Reading materials for every K-3 student to use at-home
