Action Proposed:

Staff proposes that the Board of Education (Board) ratify the contract actions taken by the Procurement Services Division within delegated authority as listed in Attachment "A" including the approval of award of Professional Service Contracts not exceeding \$250,000: New Contracts; Income Contracts; Low Value -Decentralized Purchase Orders; Goods and General Services Contracts: Purchase Orders; Low Value -Decentralized Purchase Orders; District Card Transactions; Rental of Facilities; Travel/Conference Attendance; General Stores Distribution Center; and Book/Instructional Material Purchase Orders; and approve Professional Service Contracts (exceeding \$250,000): New Contracts; Goods and General Services Contracts (exceeding \$250,000): New Contracts and Amendment as listed in Attachment "B".

Background:

Procurement Services staff prepares monthly reports for contract actions necessary for the execution of the projects approved by the Board for the educational and operational requirements of the District in accordance with Board delegated authority to the Superintendent.

Expected Outcomes:

Approval of these items will allow the goods and services provided by these contracts furnishing the equipment, supplies, or services to the Los Angeles Unified School District that support Board policies and goals.

Board Options and Consequences:

The Board can approve all actions presented, or postpone selected actions pending receipt of additional information. Non-ratification of actions awarded under delegated authority in Attachment "A" will result in immediate unavailability of products or discontinuance of services, or both. While non-ratification may be legally defendable, it would likely result in costly litigation over discontinued payments or if the District attempts to reclaim payments made to a vendor. District costs will likely increase as fewer vendors compete for future procurements. Postponement of actions presented for approval in Attachment "B" will delay contract award or delivery dates.

Policy Implications:

This action does not change District policy and conforms to California Education Code section 17604 that permits the Board of Education to delegate authority for Procurement Services (Board Report #311-15/16), which the Board exercised on May 10, 2016.

Budget Impact:

The contract actions presented are within the budget authority previously approved by the Board.

What would happen if this were not approved?


Lack of support may lead to system performance issues and increased downtimes for critical applications.

The Information Technology Division (ITD) is requesting Board ratification of an agreement with Leemak USA LLC, dba Maklee Engineering (Maklee) to provide database system performance tuning services to improve the performance of various software applications currently used in schools and offices across the District.

Why is this necessary?

As part of the contract, Maklee reviews all Oracle database environments on a monthly basis to find areas of improvement and make recommendations on technical configurations. In addition, they hold regular workshops with ITD staff to review and train on all findings. ITD staff bring individual challenges to address. At a recent session, Maklee helped staff reduce the run time of a query from 30 minutes to 6 seconds.

Database systems performance tuning is a highly specialized skill. Tuning is used to improve system performance (i.e. decrease the time it takes a query to run) or help resolve issues when a system fails. These services ultimately help improve user experience.

Some of the District systems that will benefit from tuning services are MiSiS adhoc reporting and dashboards, Welligent, Cafeteria Management System (CMS), MyData, and Parent Portal.

Why do we need to do this now?

ITD is currently implementing and upgrading a number of applications that will greatly benefit from performance tuning at this point in time. In addition, an Enterprise Reporting environment is being developed to provide dashboard and ad

hoc reports covering a variety areas including charter school, student and special education information. As new dashboards are developed, ITD anticipates the growth of the user community accessing the environment. As such, review and tuning of the application at this point in time is crucial to pre-emptively resolve potential problems that may arise after release.

What would happen if this were not approved?

Users at schools and offices may encounter longer wait times as they try to access information within applications.

What are the terms of the proposed agreement?

The proposed agreement will be in effect from September 19, 2016 through September 30, 2017. The not to exceed value is \$242,355. Funding sources include 60% General Funds and 40% Bond Funds.

Los Angeles World Airport ("LAWA") delivered an offer to purchase 98th Street Elementary School ("98th Street"). The offer to purchase is a required first step to "take" real property under the power of eminent domain. LAWA's modernization and expansion plans require 98th Street.

Why is this necessary?

Eminent Domain is a specialized area of law. The Office of General Counsel does not have an eminent domain attorney on its staff. There are three (3) law firms on the outside counsel bench to provide eminent domain legal services and none are able to provide legal services. Two law firms have a conflict of interest because they represent the City of Los Angeles and LAWA is a City of Los Angeles entity. The remaining law firm has a conflict of interest because it recently hired an attorney who used to work for LAWA.

California Eminent Domain Law Group used to be a law firm representing LAUSD. It successfully acquired several parcels of real property for LAUSD's new school construction and concluded its service to us in 2015. California Eminent Domain Law Group did not submit in the last RFP for outside legal services because LAUSD did not have any projection for eminent domain work. It is a specialized firm practicing only in the area of eminent domain.

Why do we need to do this now?

Board action to approve a single source contract with California Eminent Domain Law Group is necessary in order to provide legal advice to the Superintendent and the Board of Education so they may make an informed decision on whether to challenge the right to take, challenge LAWA's assertion of the value of 98th Street, and possible settlement options. This law firm will also assist LAUSD in obtaining an appraisal of the value of 98th Street. Now that LAWA has

delivered its offer to purchase 98th Street, LAWA may file its lawsuit to "take" 98th Street. Once served with the lawsuit, LAUSD will be required to file an answer within a time limit of Fish a legal judgement in favor of LAWA for failing to act.

What would happen if this is not approved?

A "no" vote on the single source contract for California Eminent Domain Law Group will mean the Superintendent and the Board of Education will not receive the specialized legal knowledge and experience in eminent domain necessary to make an informed decision on the "taking" of 98th Street. At this time, OGC and the existing eminent domain law firms cannot provide the specialized legal knowledge and experience to obtain the best result possible for LAUSD.

What are the terms of the proposed agreement?

The single source contract to retain the legal services of California Eminent Domain Law Group will be for the condemnation action to acquire 98th Street. The billable rate will be \$335 per hour. This billable rate is in the middle range of that charged by our existing eminent domain law firms.

The purpose of this agreement is to increase the utilization of the Wellness Center at Fremont High School by colocating a District Certified Nurse Practitioner to serve as a liaison to school nurses within the FZOC schools and provide LAUSD students and families' access to medical services.

FOR PROGRAM EVALUATION SERVICES

District offices are regularly engaged in evaluating program performance, particularly with grant programs. Most grant program evaluations are mandated. This procurement establishes a bench of qualified and competent evaluation firms so evaluations can be completed without a procurement action for each, allowing for greater efficiency.

Why is this necessary?

A Request for Proposal (RFP #20000001124) was issued to select a bench of firms to provide comprehensive evaluation services when required to do so. Evaluation is a mandate for all California Department of Education (CDE) grant funded programs. Beyond the Bell (BTB) is the main sponsor of this action, but evaluation services are also required in grants provided to the Division of Instruction, Health Education Programs, and other District offices. Because of the frequent nature of this work, a bench contract would allow BTB and other divisions to assess the services without having to do a recurring procurement action. Through this competitive process, the District will select a group of firms to conduct these evaluations in a timely manner.

Why do we need to do this now?

The current bench of evaluation firms has expired. This action establishes a new bench of evaluation firms.

What would happen if this were not approved?

The evaluation of academic programs is an integral part of program administration. If this action is not approved, there will be no firms available to execute mandated evaluations. Without this action, evaluations will be deferred and certain applications for grants may not be written.

What are the terms of the proposed agreement?

The proposed bench contract will be in effect for five (5) years. By having a bench available, District Offices will be able to conduct evaluations in an expeditious manner, saving valuable

staff time. Finally, Procurement Services required a 'Best and Final Offer' from the firms applying for the bench, and as a result, prices were lowered in some firms by 10%, representing a savings to the District.

SUBJECT: ARTS COMMUNITY NETWORK (ACN) SUPPORT FOR SERVICES

The Arts at the Core Education Plan of 2013 that was unanimously approved by the Board of Education highlighted the need for LAUSD to expand collaboration with the creative cultural networks in Los Angeles to establish and better coordinate arts programming across district schools in order to support and enhance our arts education efforts. Part of the recommended solution was to establish an infrastructure in which arts community partners could better align their work to the district's academic goals and needs as the value of the Los Angeles area arts and cultural partners cannot be over-stated. Programs initiated by these organizations enrich our schools by providing more arts learning opportunities for LAUSD students.

A Request for Proposals was issued through LAUSD Procurement for arts professional services in the 2016-17 school year through 2021 based on school needs revealed by the Arts Equity Index. The goal for arts providers is to support the work of our certificated arts teachers through arts instruction, activities, and experiences in the areas of instrumental music, vocal music, dance, theatre, film, writing, and visual/media arts to underserved LAUSD schools and their identified students in conjunction with California State Standards in the Arts.

Out of eighty-one proposal submissions, forty-two were approved for contracts across the various arts categories.

Why is this necessary?

To insure that every student in LAUSD is receiving equitable access to the arts that compliments instruction by certificated District arts personnel, the Arts Community Network vendors will begin/expand their existing services during the second semester of the 2016-17 school year. The Community Arts Manager of the Arts Education Branch will coordinate with each vendor to insure that every Local District and Board Member District receives equal and fair opportunities for these services to enhance and support arts instruction for students.

Why do we need to do this now?

There is currently a shortage of certificated arts teachers that would allow LAUSD to provide equity and access to arts instruction in the various arts disciplines in all schools. This additional support must be provided now so that greater equity and access is gained by all schools and students within the

district. The Arts Education Branch recognizes that additional arts programming provided by our arts and cultural partners is essential in order to meet the equity and access gaps across the District.

What would happen if this were not approved?

The growth of the arts program would be negatively affected in two critical ways:

Expansion of the arts program to truly provide equity and access of arts resources to students across the District would be diminished at a time when the arts are in greater demand.

The investment of establishing a funding infrastructure and relationship between the creative cultural network in Los Angeles and the district in order to provide greater equity and access to the arts for students would be lost, again negatively impacting students who deserve arts support immediately, not in distant future years.

Why is this contract an after the fact? (if applicable)

Not applicable, there is no after the fact contract.

What are the terms of the proposed agreement?

The terms of the contract are in accordance with the rules and regulations of LAUSD Procurement to provide equitable funding to arts community vendors to provide instruction for underserved schools based on the arts equity index and their students. The Arts Education Branch (AEB) has budgeted within its Targeted Student Population funds to provide for these student-based services. This multi-year approval of services allows for LAUSD to maximize its financial investment at current market rates and create a support program that can yield research data on the effectiveness of the arts. Many of the amounts requested were reduced by the source selection committee in order to distribute award funds in equitable and proportionate ways.

The Information Technology Division (ITD) is requesting Board of Education approval of master agreements to provide network equipment supporting capital investment projects, replacement, upgrades and repair of the District's local area networks (LAN), wireless networks, and wide area networks (WAN).

Why is this necessary?

Old network equipment must be repaired, upgraded and/or replaced in order to support bandwidth and security requirements needed for current and newer applications and instructional materials as well as ensure network reliability and availability. This contract allows the District to purchase network equipment at competitively solicited, high-volume, discounted rates.

Why do we need to do this now?

The current contracts to purchase network equipment are nearly exhausted and new contracts are needed to ensure that school services continue without interruption. Additionally, new LAN and WAN technologies have been incorporated into the agreements.

What would happen if there were not approved?

Without approval, the District would be without a purchasing vehicle to procure network equipment at competitively solicited, high-volume, discounted rates from qualified suppliers.

What are the terms of the proposed procurement?

The proposed agreements are for a period of five years. The cumulative not to exceed amount for all agreements is \$52 million. Purchases are funded based on individual project budgets that include various funding sources.

SUBJECT: IFB No. 2000001042 Transportation Services for LA's BEST (After School Program)

Background

On November 15, 2016, the Board will be asked to approve a contract for transportation services for the LA's BEST After School Enrichment Program, a division of Beyond the Bell Branch. In providing safe and supervised after school education, enrichment and recreation programs for 25,000 students at 193 LAUSD sites, LA's BEST values the opportunity to offer field trip experiences to children as central to its core components.

Why is this necessary?

This contract endeavors to expedite the process of making bus transportation available to facilitate these experiences, by permitting a collapse of the requisition process into a single contract that would cover approximately 470 program-wide and site-based educational field trips starting December 2016 and the subsequent 36 months.

Why do we need to do this now?

The existing contract has expired. Therefore, costs in the interim will be higher and we'll be forced to offer fewer trips.

What would happen if we were not approved?

If not approved, many children would lose the opportunity to have new and unique experiences, and when available, we would have to pay a higher rate for bus services.

What are the terms of the proposed agreements?

The term of the Contract will be 36 months and up to two (2) 12 month extensions may be awarded.

This contract is 100% funded through allocated state and local grant dollars which comprise a portion of the LA's BEST annual operating budget. No portion of this contract will be funded through the LAUSD general fund. Upon approval, this contract would be financed by the LA's BEST program through these identified grant dollars. No other division of the Beyond the Bell Branch is affected by this contract request or its subsequent administration.

Introduction:

In alignment with the District's goals of 100% Graduation and Proficiency for All, the Student Involvement, Development and Empowerment Unit (Student Unit) requests Board approval of the above aforementioned contractor in order to accomplish the goals set for the targeted student populations outlined in the Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) and to close the achievement gap.

The consultant's work will center on creating more opportunities for young women in leadership, fostering student engagement in the elementary and middle school years, and promoting college- and career-readiness. These services are ones that require specialized skills, expertise and experiences.

Explain how are the services contracted for are not available within LAUSD, cannot be performed satisfactorily by LAUSD employees, or are of such highly specialized or technical nature that the necessary knowledge, experience and ability are not available through LAUSD?

Topics such as discussing gender, stereotypes, race, culture, implicit bias, and institutionalized inequities, are sensitive subjects to discuss and require extensive expertise and knowledge in order to facilitate large- and small-group discussions. Specifically, this consultant has extensive expertise in working with young women to bridge the gap between societal perceptions, peer pressures, students' social-emotional feelings, and their academic achievement.

This contractor brings relevant and timely research from her doctoral dissertation that addresses a critical need for the District - increasing the academic achievement of African American youth, especially women, and closing the school-to-prison pipeline. This consultant has traveled around the country speaking on panels and as a keynote speaker on early childhood education. She has been featured in the Washington Post,

on CNN, MSNBC, and NPR's show, This American Life. BOARD REPORT



This consultant will focus full-time on pedagogy, professional development, and on building and strengthening relationships with students and parents of color. This will involve her being accessible during the day and evening hours to meet with and empower students and parents in whatever capacity is needed.

She will work to build capacity of District leadership and help standardize leadership class curriculum and offerings at the elementary through high school levels. Working closely with middle school and high school leadership advisors, this consultant will continue to create resources that can be utilized across District elementary and middle schools to provide consistent expectations for the development of student leaders.

Why do we need to do this now?

The urgency to support our young women and student leaders is increasingly apparent. Achievement gaps persist and underrepresentation of women in STEM and leadership roles continue to plague the nation. This contract allows District staff to expand the successful programs that are already in place which have enhanced and diversified the experiences of our students and to improve the quality of training materials to be used with elementary, middle and high school student leaders, teachers, advisors and families.

District staff requests approval of this contractor at this time to build upon two other important projects that are currently in need of expansion:

- Last year, the second annual Young Women Conference brought together 330 young women from District high schools to learn and grow their leadership skills. Young women were connected to successful role models who provided inspiration and strategies for success.
- Last year, in collaboration with Beyond the Bell, the first Middle School Leadership Conference, was held for 150 6th-8th grade student leaders.

What would happen if this were not approved?

If the contract is not approved, the aforementioned programs that are supported by the consultant will have to be scaled back. For example, additional young women's leadership programs will have to be placed on hold until additional personnel can be made available and District capacity can be built in this specialized area of focus.

What are the terms of the proposed agreement?

- The period of service will be from October 1, 2016, to June 30, 2017.
- The consultant will work at various LAUSD school sites and at the Parent, Community and Student Services office.

Consultant shall provide the following services:

Improve the achievement of students in low-performing schools through student-driven solutions and additional opportunities to refine student

leadership skills, specifically for those of young women.

 Develop and maintain school communities that support student leadership and create opportunities for student, family and teacher collaboration to ensure all students are achieving at high levels.

• Work to enhance programs that will improve the academic achievement of young women and build their leadership skills.

- Consultant will provide the District with invoice(s) for services performed and approved by the Student Unit, and payment will be based on the number of hours approved for each project.
- Consultant shall invoice on a monthly basis.

In alignment with the Board Resolution Support of President Obama's My Brother's Keeper Challenge and Support for a Bold, United Los Angeles County Initiative (Res-016-15/16) passed on November 10, 2015, the Student Involvement, Development and Empowerment Unit (Student Unit) requests Board approval of the above aforementioned contractor in order to accomplish the goals set for the targeted student populations outlined in the Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) and to close the achievement gap.

The consultant's work will center on the areas of student empowerment, leadership and engagement, college- and career-readiness, increase of graduation rates, the Village Movement Mentoring Program, My Brother's Keeper Implementation Plan and the African American Parent Study Group. The consultant will create and deliver professional development, training and workshops on strategies for educating young men and women of color, strengthening parenting skills, and developing and mentoring student leaders. In addition, this consultant will assist the Student Unit in conducting outreach to the community at-large to create productive partnerships for the District. These services require specialized skills, expertise and experiences.

Explain how are the services contracted for are not available within LAUSD, cannot be performed satisfactorily by LAUSD employees, or are of such highly specialized or technical nature that the necessary knowledge, experience and ability are not available through LAUSD?

Topics such as discussing race, culture, implicit bias, and institutionalized racism, are sensitive subjects to discuss and require extensive expertise and knowledge in order to facilitate large- and small-group discussions. Specifically, this consultant has extensive expertise in working with young men of color to bridge the gap between their socioemotional feelings, societal perceptions, peer pressures, and their academic

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achievement.

Presently, the District leadership is developing capacity of staff in this area, and is using this consultant to build further capacity of staff.

Why do we need to do this now?

District data continue to point out that African American and Latino students are underserved and do not achieve at the same rates of their White and Asian counterparts. Capturing the voices of our students of color is imperative to inform District staff as to how to ameliorate this achievement gap. Waiting longer only allows the gap to persist. This contractor specializes in being able to facilitate such conversations that will lead to timely and important District action steps.

District staff requests approval of this contractor at this time to build upon three other important projects that are currently in need of expansion:

- Since December of 2015, a monthly meeting entitled *The Gathering of Great Minds* has occurred. Community groups, fraternities, higher education, media, government officials, probation and law enforcement personnel and religious leaders have united to collaborate on a common plan to assist young men of color to excel in school and beyond.
- The third annual *Young Men of Color Conference* is scheduled for February of 2017. Last year, this conference brought together approximately 250 high school students of color from across the District, representing approximately 23 District high schools, to provide collective inspiration, converse with successful role models, and identify resiliency strategies to help our students successfully navigate the educational system and make promising life choices.
- As a result of the *Young Men of Color Conference*, the young men requested ongoing mentoring. In January of 2016, the Village Movement Mentoring Program was initiated. The District and the UCLA Collaborative currently supports four "Villages," and is in the process of expanding to nine "Villages." Each Village has approximately 20 student Scholars lead by 5 adult Villagers that mentor our students twice a month in a small-group setting at the school site. These groups provide a safe, collaborative space to reinforce conflict management, leadership, resiliency, conflict and social-emotional skills in order to provide more equity and access to A-G rigorous course work, graduation, and college entrance and retention.

This is a critical time for the District to strengthen our commitment and focus on supporting students of color. In addition, this consultant will also support and strengthen LAUSD's community outreach and the African American Parent Study Group which will assist in increasing parental outreach to the African American Community. This parent group started last month and is being supported by the Parent, Community, and Student Services (PCSS) and Local District West leadership.



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What would happen if this were not approved?

If the contract is not approved, crucial momentum for the initiatives that are focused on supporting students of color may be stifled and fragmented. Additionally, crucial professional development and curriculum designed to engage students of color, which are part of this consultant's expertise, will not be available.

What are the terms of the proposed agreement?

- The period of service will be from October 1, 2016, to June 30, 2017.
- The consultant will work at identified high-need LAUSD school sites and at the Parent, Community, and Student Services office.

Consultant shall provide the following services:

- Develop and enhance teachers' content knowledge and instructional strategies aligned to California content standards and frameworks.
- Improve the achievement of students in low-performing schools through student-driven solutions.
- Develop and maintain school communities that enhance student leadership, while creating opportunities for student, family and teacher collaboration to ensure that all students are achieving at high levels.
- Provide support to teachers on how to engage disengaged student subgroups by utilizing effective instructional engagement strategies.
- Provide support to students, especially young men of color, so that they feel heard, respected and valued.
- Assist in increasing the engagement and participation of African American parents in District meetings, professional developments and workshops.
