AMENDMENT TO THE INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY DIVISION STRATEGIC EXECUTION PLAN TO UPDATE THE INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY INITIATIVE AND APPROVE BOND FUNDING FOR EDUCATIONAL TECHNOLOGY GRANTS

WHEREAS, District Staff proposes that the Board of Education approve an amendment to the Information Technology Division Strategic Execution Plan to Update the Instructional Technology Initiative and Approve Bond Funding for Educational Technology Grants; and

WHEREAS, The Instructional Technology Initiative, established in February 2013, enabled district staff to provide a 1:1 computing environment at specified schools to support the transition to the Common Core State Standards (CCCS) and to provide an individualized, interactive, and information-rich learning environment; and,

WHEREAS, many of the devices delivered to these 1:1 schools were purchased as part of a bundle that included Pearson educational content; and,

WHEREAS, following a series of challenges, the District discontinued using Pearson content and negotiated settlement agreements with the providers of that content, Apple and Lenovo. Those agreements resulted in settlement proceeds of approximately \$6.4 million being returned to the District. Approximately \$6.2 million of the proceeds are a return of bond funds, which must be spent on capital investments; and,

WHEREAS, in September 2015, the Superintendent proposed to the Board that the bond portion of these settlements be invested in a matching grant program that would expand schools' access to instructional technology where there was a need and innovative ideas existed for how to use it; and,

WHEREAS, the grant program was envisioned to promote collaboration among District schools. The Educational Technology Grant program was developed through a collaborative

effort that included leadership from each Local District, the Division of Instruction, the Information Technology Division and the Superintendent's office; and

WHEREAS, District Staff from the Division of Instruction and Local District offices scored the applications using the rubric that had been distributed. In accordance with the guidelines established at the beginning of the program, Local District (LD) offices made the final determination of grant award winners and amounts based on LD staff's knowledge of school need and their readiness as well as the rubric score each application received.

WHEREAS, all grant funds will be spent on capital equipment that qualifies for bond funding and all other components of a school's solution that are not capital in nature will be funded with non-bond funds from the school's matching contribution.

WHEREAS, District Staff has concluded that the proposed SEP amendment will facilitate implementation of the ITD SEP, and therefore, it will not adversely affect the District's ability to successfully complete the ITD SEP.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. The School Construction Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee recommends that the Board of Education adopt an amendment to the Information Technology Division Strategic Execution Plan to Update the Instructional Technology Initiative and Approve Bond Funding for Educational Technology Grants as defined in Board Report 363-15/16, a copy of which is attached hereto in the form it was presented to the BOC and is incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. This resolution shall be transmitted to the Los Angeles Unified School District Board of Education and posted on the Oversight Committee's website.
- 3. The District is directed to track the above recommendation and to report on the adoption, rejection, or pending status of the recommendations as provided in section 6.2 of the Charter and Memorandum of Understanding between the Oversight Committee and the District.

BOARD REPORT

Action Proposed: Staff proposes that the Board of Education (BOE) amend the Information

Technology Division Strategic Execution Plan (ITD-SEP) to update the Instructional Technology Initiative (ITI) and approve the use of bond funds to award Educational Technology Grants to the 242 school sites

listed in Attachments A.

This work is scheduled to be complete in June 2017 and the estimated

budget is \$9,716,347.

Background: The Instructional Technology Initiative, established in February 2013,

enabled district staff to provide a 1:1 computing environment at specified schools to support the transition to the Common Core State Standards (CCCS) and to provide an individualized, interactive, and information-rich learning environment. Many of the devices delivered to these 1:1 schools were purchased as part of a bundle that included the Pearson

System of Courses.

The District discontinued using the Pearson System of Courses and

negotiated agreements that resulted in settlement proceeds of approximately \$6.4 million being made available to the District either by

return of funds or credits against outstanding invoices. Approximately \$6.2 million of the proceeds are a return of bond funds, which must be spent on capital investments. The remainder is unrestricted general fund

which has been earmarked for the repair of broken devices.

In September 2015, the Superintendent proposed to the Board that the bond portion of these settlement proceeds be invested in a matching grant program that would expand schools' access to instructional technology where there was a need and innovative ideas existed for how to use it. Additionally, the grant program was envisioned to promote collaboration among District schools. The Educational Technology Grant program was developed through a collaborative effort that included leadership from each Local District, the Division of Instruction, the Information Technology Division and the Superintendent's office.

A grant application template, scoring rubric, and completion guidelines were communicated to schools in November 2015 and a deadline of January 8, 2016 was set for application submittals. Three-hundred forty three schools submitted applications prior to the deadline and staff from the Division of Instruction and Local District offices scored the applications using the rubric that had been distributed. In accordance with the guidelines established at the beginning of the program, Local District (LD) offices made the final determination of grant award winners and amounts based on LD staff's knowledge of school need and their readiness as well as the rubric score each application received.

In order to qualify for the grant, each school was required to commit matching funds. Schools that proposed a partnership with another school or an outside organization as part of their plan were required to provide matching funds equal to half of their grant award. Schools that did not propose a partnership were required to provide matching funds equal to their entire grant award.

All grant funds will be spent on capital equipment that qualifies for bond funding. The other components of a school's solution that are not capital in nature will be funded with non-bond funds from the school's matching contribution.

Expected Outcomes:

Staff anticipates that the Board of Education will approve this proposed action to enable the use of bond funds to award educational technology grants to the 242 school sites listed in Attachment A.

Board Options and Consequences:

Approval of this action will enable staff to use bond funds to award educational technology grants to the 242 school sites listed in Attachment A. Failure to approve the proposed action will prevent staff from using bond funds to award the above referenced educational technology grants.

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Policy Implications:	This action is consistent with the District's long-term goal to address unmet school facilities needs as described in Measures R, Y and Q.
Budget Impact:	The estimated total investment for the proposed action is \$9,716,347.
	Of this amount, \$6,011,839 is bond-program funds from the current ITI project which has sufficient available budget to address this need. This project is funded with Bond Program funds from the School Upgrade Program targeted for technology infrastructure and system upgrades.
	Additionally, \$3,704,508 of non-bond matching funds will be supplied by schools in the amounts identified on Attachment A. Identification, verification, and commitment of these matching funds is a pre-requisite for the expenditure of bond dollars on qualifying items at each school site.
Issues and Analysis:	Staff from the Bond Compliance group is engaged with staff from the Division of Instruction (DOI) and the Information Technology Division (ITD) to ensure that bond funds are expended on qualifying capital items only. Additionally, staff from the Budget Services Division is actively engaged with staff from the DOI and ITD to ensure that each school site's required matching funds are identified, verified, and committed prior to the expenditure of grant funds at that school site.
	Once schools have selected the final list of grant-funded items to purchase and matching funds have been verified and committed, an informative will be sent providing summary information by school site to members of the Citizen's Bond Oversight Committee and the Board of Education.
Bond Oversight Committee Recommendations	The item was considered by the School Construction Bond Citizens' Oversight Committee (BOC) at its meeting on March 31, 2016. Staff has concluded that this proposed SEP amendment will help facilitate implementation of the ITD-SEP and therefore, it will not adversely affect the District's ability to successfully complete the SEP.
