PURPOSE: The purpose of this memorandum is to assist in the planning of school and

work events. The increasingly pluralistic population of the United States creates diverse working and learning communities. This Calendar of Commemorative Dates and Observances is a tool meant to enhance understanding, respect, and awareness among the many religious, ethnic, and cultural identities in our school communities, as a resource for schools to incorporate these dates into their instructional activities, and as a

reference in scheduling school activities.

MAJOR This memorandum replaces MEM-5466.13, Calendar of Commemorative CHANGES:

Dates and Observances, School Year 2023-2024, with updated dates and

observances since the last issuance.

BACKGROUND: The Calendar of Commemorative Dates and Observances draws from

> multiple sources, including the California Department of Education, Los Angeles Unified Board Rule 1102, Board of Education resolutions, and cultural, religious, and community calendars. This calendar is based on information available at the time of production. Inclusion does not imply official endorsement by LA Unified. Omissions are not intended to be

exclusionary in nature.

Lessons around this content are to be age-appropriate, culturally responsive, and taught in a historical and social studies context, as outlined in the California History/Social Science Framework. Schools are expected to teach about religion in a neutral, prudent, and objective manner. The 1963 Supreme Court clarified public schools' role in the objective teaching about religion, "... it might well be said that one's



education is not complete without a study of comparative religion or the history of religion and its relationship to the advancement of civilization," School District of Abington Township, Pennsylvania v. Schempp (No. 142) (1963) 374 U.S. 203, 225. Students cannot be compelled to participate in non-curricular activities, such as Halloween parades or other celebratory events. However, there is no expectation that students will be shielded from exposure to ideas that conflict with their religious beliefs. (Refer to BUL-5479.2, Guidelines for Teaching About Religions.)

The Los Angeles Unified School District's Board of Education interprets the California Education Code Section 48205 to include the observance of a secular historical remembrance or cultural holiday or ceremony as "justifiable personal reasons" for absence from school. This allows students to receive excused absences for observances such as Armenian Genocide Remembrance or Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day). Board Rule 1102 also clarifies that such excused absences would maintain a student's eligibility for District-wide awards based on attendance. ### CALENDAR OF COMMEMORATIVE DATES AND OBSERVANCES ACADEMIC YEAR 2024-25

This calendar is provided to help plan school and work calendars. There are twelve federal holidays:

#### Set by date:

- New Year's Day, January 1
- Inauguration Day, January 20\* (occurs every 4 years)
- Juneteenth, June 19
- Independence Day, July 4
- Veterans Day, November 11
- Christmas Day, December 25

#### Floating Event:

 Thanksgiving, fourth Thursday of November Typically celebrated on Mondays:

- Martin Luther King Jr.'s Birthday, third Monday in January
- President's Day, third Monday in February
- Memorial Day, last Monday in May
- Labor Day first Monday in September
- Indigenous People's Day, second Monday in October

The dates of anniversaries of historical events, special commemorative occasions, and ethnic, cultural, and religious celebrations are provided to assist schools that wish to incorporate these dates into their instructional activities. Religious events and observances are coded to indicate the faith(s) with which they are commonly associated.

Many dates have both secular and religious significance. Christmas, for example, is widely celebrated as a secular holiday unrelated to its religious significance. The observation of some events may vary in accordance with the calendar being used, regional customs, group preferences, and lunar/solar cycles.

This document uses the following legend to indicate events whose observation has calendaring variations:

Some religious holidays are solar-or lunar- based and begin at sundown of the preceding day and end at sunset of the day listed. These events are identified with a plus symbol (+).

The occurrence of floating events is adjusted to fall on a standard workday or week, on a designated day rather than a designated date, or to adhere to a calendar other than a Gregorian calendar. For example, *No Name Calling Week* is always observed on school days, *Thanksgiving* is always observed the fourth Thursday in November, and Jewish holy days follow the Jewish calendar. These floating events are indicated with an asterisk (\*).

Other observances have local or regional variations. These events are marked with a caret (^).

When the commemoration of non-Federally recognized events conflicts with scheduled school activities, such as during the testing period, schools may opt to honor the event on an alternate date.

Information for this *Calendar of Commemorative Dates and Observances* is gathered from various sources and is not intended as definitive or official notification. Dates are based on the information available at the time of authorship. June 8*	Pentecost – Whitsunday (RC) (P)	Pentecost to commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles and disciples of Jesus.  Observed fifty days or the seventh Sunday after Easter.
June 8*	Race Unity Day (Ba)	The Bahá'í-sponsored observance promotes racial harmony and understanding and the essential unity of humanity. Observed the second Sunday in June.
June 11	Play Day	Established by the United Nations in 2024 to preserve, promote and prioritize play as a universal language that fosters community and national pride. (Board Rule 1102)
June 12	Loving Day	Observes the 1967 Supreme Court Loving v. Virginia decision that struck down the miscegenation laws barring interracial marriage.
