

Be prepared to shelter in place or evacuate the classroom with students. Have on hand:

- Snacks
- Activities
- Rainy day lessons/activities to use during prolonged periods of inclement weather.
- Plans to rearrange your classroom if you have to temporarily take in additional students due to storm damage or staff delays
- Emergency lesson plans for last-minutes subs or to replace "high-tech" lessons in case of a loss of power or internet
- Flashlights and batteries (one for you and one for students to take to restrooms which often have no windows)
- Securely closed windows/doors when leaving to reduce chances of water intrusion
- Wastebasket liners/trash bags to use as emergency rain ponchos
- Space for student rain gear and a wastebasket to hold umbrellas
- Walk-off mats at doors to reduce slips and falls; alert custodial staff to wet spots
- "Go kit" with rosters, contact information, emergency supplies and flashlight

El Niño brings rainstorms and high winds that have multiple effects at school.

- · Flooding to school sites or surrounding area
- · Delays in student arrival and dismissal due to weather
- Loss of power

Effects

- · Loss of phone service, cell or landline
- Indoor activities if student cannot go outside (recess, lunch, PE, etc.)
- Extended school day if conditions are unsafe for dismissal or delay after-school pick-ups
- Relocation/evacuation of part or all of a school, if flooded or otherwise damaged



- Discuss weather with students; incorporate into lessons
- Monitor wet/cold students for health issues
- Know how any students with disabilities/medical needs may be impacted by weather
- Remind students never to play in river/creek channels or storm drains. A few inches of water can easily knock people off their feet.





LAUSD Classrooms



- **Headlights on** will help you see better on foggy or rainy days and it will help other drivers see you.
- · Increase following distance and watch for brake lights ahead.
- Slow down. It takes longer to stop in wet weather, and the faster you drive, the greater the chances of hydroplaning.
- Turn around, don't drown. Never drive through moving flood waters. It takes just 12 inches of water to move a car.



- Prepare your home and family for weather emergencies; get a kit, make a plan, be informed.
- Remember, you are a Disaster Service Worker and may need to stay at work for an extended period of time during an emergency.
- Keep emergency supplies in car and classroom, including food, medication, rain gear and extra clothing.
- Wear weather-appropriate clothing and protective gear.
- · Allow extra time to get to/from work in wet weather.
- · Contact your supervisor if you may be delayed in arriving at school
