OPENING

Deborah Brandy called the meeting to order at 3:30 PM.

ROLL CALL

Paul Gonzales conducted the roll call. Quorum was not established during roll call. Quorum was established later in meeting.

MINUTES

Deborah Brandy asked the members to review the May 17, 2018 meeting minutes. A motion to accept the minutes was not made due to quorum not being established. Once quorum was established the minutes for April 19, 2018 and May 17, 2018 were accepted. A motion to accept the minutes was made by Brent Andersen. The motion was seconded by Luis Rodriguez-Cazares. All members were in favor. No members opposed. There were no abstentions. The motion carried.

Ms. Brandy began the meeting by welcoming everyone to 2018-2019 school year. Ms. Brandy followed by reviewing the documents in the packets.

Ms. Brandy reminded the audience about the protocols regarding asking questions or commenting. She reminded the members to raise their hand and state their first and last name prior to speaking. She also reminded the non-members to sign up on the public speaker sign-in and they would be provided two minutes at the end of meeting to ask questions or comment.

2017-2018 STUDENT DISCIPLINE AND RUBRIC OF IMPLEMENTATION (ROI) DATA

Ms. Brandy began by providing the audience with an overview of the Board resolution, 2013 School Discipline Policy and School Climate Bill of Rights, the Discipline Foundation Policy (DFP), and LCAP goals. She continued by providing an overview of the 2017-2018 data. She stated the data is still being cleaned. She reviewed and discussed suspension rates, and instructional days lost to suspensions from 2007-08 school year to the 2017-18 school year. The audience noticed a significate decrease in instructional days lost to suspensions during that period of time. She further discussed the 2016-17 and 2017-18 suspension reports. The suspension reports disaggregate data by ethnicity. At this time, the audience was able to notice the disproportionality on suspension of our African American students and students with disabilities. Mr. Paul Robak asked if we have data prior to 2007. Ms. Brandy stated she believed it started with 2007 because of the bulletin. Ms. Laura Zeff stated that data is available prior to 2007. Ms. Brandy stated that Ms. Zeff would be presenting later in the year and asked if she could bring the data at that time, it would be greatly appreciated. Officer Etue asked if single student suspension rates are decreasing, are graduation rates increasing. Ms. Brandy said we really need the experts to dig into the question. If that is the question we would like answered, we can reach out to the Office of Data and Accountability and they will be able to

help with that. Ms. Tanya Franklin gave input on data based on ethnicity. Other members had additional questions and comments, which Ms. Brandy addressed.

She added by informing the audience that future Task Force meetings would include data presentations from Local District (LD) Administrators of Operations (AOO) and their teams. Presenting in September will be community-based organization (CADRE and Public Counsel). Officer Etue will also present at the Task Force and Alonzo Webb, LD West AOO and his team will present in November. A RJ panel and auditor will also be participating in future meetings. The format of the meetings changed to ensure presenters have ample time to present and time is provided to address all questions and comments.

GROUP ACTIVITY

The audience was placed into four groups and each group was assigned a section to read from an article. Two articles were read. Each group was asked to read and discuss their section and a spokesperson shared their response to the entire group.

After each team presented, Ms. Brandy mentioned to the audience that Tyrone Howard would be a guest speaker at the September Restorative Justice Family about culture and race.

2017-2018 STUDENT DISCIPLINE AND RUBRIC OF IMPLEMENTATION (ROI) DATA CONT'D

Ms. Brandy continued her presentation. She provided an overview of the ROI. She discussed the process, scoring of the ROI, and a summary of the 2017-18 ROI report. The 2017-18 ROI goal was 88% of schools would reach a ranking of "Green." 92% of schools reached a ranking of "Green." Exceeded the goal by 4%. Ms. Brandy also provided information about the Restorative Justice training plan and the schools scheduled to be trained during the 2018-19 school year. In closing, she shared the schools that currently have a RJ Teacher Adviser on their campus.

Ms. Brandy closed with a Q&A session. Julija Zubac asked about a safety committee. Ms. Watson answered Ms. Zubac's question.

Ms. Brandy thanked everyone for attending and asked the audience to share the articles they with their offices or staff.

ADJOURNMENT

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Luis Rodrigues-Cazares. The motion was seconded by Brent Andersen. All members were in favor. No members opposed. There were no abstentions. The motion carried. The meeting adjourned at 5:02 PM.




Leading to graduation Class Of 2018


